

### **Newsletter**

It's been a busy couple of months for Risca East Community Council with lots to discuss and for us to get involved with.

One of our main concerns centred on the closure of the public toilets at the Tredegar Park in Risca town, perhaps better known as Risca Park, and how this impacts our wider community. At a special meeting, it was unanimously decided to support the campaign, 'Save our Toilets', by donating £1000 in the hope that the toilets would be open in time for the summer holidays. Risca East has no direct influence on the work being undertaken to reopen the toilets but we have given a firm commitment to support the charity being set up and we wish the group every success for the future. Another major decision Risca East Community Council has taken this year is to support the 'Summer Sport Scheme' being run at Risca Leisure Centre, Last vear, we agreed to fund free transport for children attending the scheme but this year we decided to fund free places for children from the Risca East ward at a cost of £2500. At the time of writing, children are attending the sport scheme and it's hoped that at least 60 children will have benefited by the end of the summer break. If the Councillors believe it's been a success, we hope to increase the number of free places during the summer of 2020.



Community Council will, once again, be working in partnership with Risca Town Council in organising the Armistice and Commemoration Service on Friday evening, 8th November at Moriah Church. There will be laying of wreaths on the morning of Saturday, 9th November in the Memorial Garden, Risca town and a service at the cenotaph on Sunday morning, 10th November. Please keep an eye on local Facebook pages for further information.

This winter, Risca East Community Council will be having a Christmas tree in the grounds of St David's Church at the junction of Thistle Way and Elm Drive, Ty Sign. We're also planning to increase the number of lights along Elm Drive with an official switch-on followed by refreshments and a children's party at St David's Church hall on Friday, 29th November, 5 pm until 7.30 pm. All are welcome to attend to join in the fun. Information will be shared via Facebook and on Risca East Community Council noticeboards: one outside St David's Church, one near the 'Top Shops' on Elm Drive leading to Holly Road, another at the junction of Channel View and Manor Road and one by the bus stop at the bottom of Herbert Avenue.

## The 'Long Bridge' by Geoff Smith

The feature on the Sirhowy to Newport Tramroad by Uplander in the previous edition of the Directory reminded me that I had long intended to write about this forgotten feature of Risca.

When the early tramroads were built the route taken was dictated by not only the industry to be served, but also the attitude of the landowners through whose land the route was to pass through. The later railways were built with Parliamentary sanction and thus had compulsory purchase power, but this was not the case with the early tramroads. The Monmouthshire Canal Company's tramroad from Newport into the Western Valley more or less followed the canal on the Eastern side of the Valley, so when it came to building the tramroad to connect with the Sirhowy tramroad at Nine Mile Point, the opportunity was taken to serve those industries on the Western side of the valley Northwards from Risca, rather than branching off at Cross Keys.

I suspect that there was a land ownership issue here, but have no documentary evidence to support this theory.

Thus, the tramroad came South from Nine Mile Point and served the notorious Black Vein Colliery and its coke ovens, a large brickworks, extensive limekilns and a copper works on the Western side at Risca (Danygraig). All of this section of the tramroad is now beneath the A467 road. To join with the Western Valley tramroad a magnificent viaduct, the 'Long Bridge' was constructed. It consisted of 32 arches, built of stone. was 48ft above the valley floor, and is said to have cost around £40,000 in 1805. By 1859 the tramroad had been converted to a conventional railway, which took an easier and less curvaceous course, as the photograph shows. For the next 40 years the 'Long Bridge' slumbered, unused, until from about 1900 it was slowly demolished, and its stonework recycled, being used in numerous buildings in the area.

It is hard to understand why such and expensive structure was considered necessary. Tramroads were better able to cope with gradients than the later railways, so a ramp down to the river, a simple bridge and another ramp up would have been a much cheaper option.

The later railway is also long gone, and its embankment levelled to provide extensive playing fields. Of the 'Long Bridge' itself just some stonework remains, just to the side of Risca Builders Merchant's yard.

Of the tramroads themselves, remains are few. The course of the railway is a foot and cycle track from near Cross Keys, and a bridge with the stone sleeper blocks of the tramway is to be seen at Nine Mile Point. At Pye Corner, if you stand facing the 'Hair Junction' premises, to the right a lane disappears behind the houses in Western Valley Road. This was the tramroad course.

# In the wrong place, at the wrong time

At 11.15 on the morning of Sunday the 3rd September 1939, Prime Minister Neville Chamberlain announced that a state of war existed between us and Germany. At 19.40 on the evening of the 3rd September 1939, the passenger liner SS Athenia was struck by a torpedo fired by the German submarine U-30.

The Athenia, en-route from Glasgow to Canada, sank in the North Atlantic some 250 miles off the West coast of Ireland. 98 passengers and 19 of the crew were killed. One of the passengers killed, lost at sea, was a Risca girl, 17 year old Nancy Redgers.

Nancy, along with her sister Eileen and their mother were returning to Canada after coming

over to visit Mrs Olive Jenkins, the eldest daughter of Mrs Redgers, at No.1 Tredegar Street, Risca, the former home of the Redgers family.

Mrs Redgers and her daughters had arrived in Risca in July 1939. It was the first time they had visited their old home since July 1929, when Thomas Redgers, his



wife Harriet and four of their children had emigrated from Risca to Toronto, Canada. After spending a short time in a Glasgow hospital recovering from shock and exposure, on the 7th October Mrs Redgers and her daughter Eileen sailed from Liverpool back to their home in Canada.

#### 'ONE OF JESUS SUNBEAMS'

These are the words inscribed on a memorial stone flower pot, on a grave in Danygraig Cemetery, the last resting place of DEREK WHITING, a seven year old evacuee from Greenford, London. Derek was one of the hundreds of children, with and without their mothers, evacuated from London and the South Coast, who arrived by train at Risca Station, at the

beginning of WW2. On the 3rd June 1940, 500 children, evacuated from Dover, Rochester and Chatham, arrived at Risca Station at 10.45am, and by the evening all had been billeted. By the end of 1940. 1,059 unaccompanied children, along with 311 accompanied children and 207 mothers, had been billeted in the Risca Urban. District. Derek had arrived in Risca in October 1940 along with other pupils and teachers from Stanhope School in Greenford, Middlesex, 'Father Sees Son Killed at Risca' - This was the heading of an article published in the South Wales Argus on the 4th July 1941. It told of the death of Derek Whiting, a boy evacuee, aged seven, the son of Mr and Mrs John Ralph Whiting. Mr Whiting had come down from Greenford to see his son who



was billeted at No.10 Tredegar Street, Risca. Derek and his father were returning by bus to Risca after visiting friends billeted in Cross Keys. When they alighted from the bus Derek ran across the road ahead of his father and was knocked down and fatally injured by a passing lorry. The funeral service, held at St. Margaret's Church, was attended by teachers and pupil evacuees from Stanhope School, and friends from Risca.

#### 'The greatest gift of all'

On the 18th August 1944, Alan Hugh Jones, the youngest son of Joseph and Alice Matilda Jones of 'The Café', 36 Tredegar Street, Risca, celebrated his nineteenth birthday as a sailor on the minesweeper H.M.S. Britomart. On the 27th August 1944, Alan died of wounds received in action

when the Britomart was attacked and sank off the north coast of France. On the 4th September 1944, Alan was buried in Risca Old Cemetery, Cromwell Road. Alan had been pupil of Danygraig and Pontywaun County Schools, and was employed as an apprentice at Yendall's Print Works before joining the Navy in 1943. For many years after the War, on the 27th August, Alan was remembered by his family in the 'Roll of Honour' column of the South Wales Argus. Jones - In most cherished memory of our dear son Alan, died August 27th, 1944, by enemy action, off the north coast of France. 'He gave the greatest gift of all. His unfinished life that we might live.' Always in the thoughts of mam, dad and family. In 1994, many years after his mam and dad had passed away, it was revealed that Alan, along with the twenty other crewmen of the Britomart, had not been killed by the Enemy, but by the R.A.F. "Due to an error in communication", a Flotilla of four minesweepers, included the Britomart, sailing close to an area off the French coast still occupied by the enemy, were assumed to be German ships, and the R.A.F. was ordered to attack them. H.M.S. Britomart and H.M.S. Hussar were sunk and H.M.S. Salamander and H.M.S. Jason damaged. 117 crewmen were killed and 153 wounded. Of those killed, four were local boys.



Denham, 27, both from Newport. Alan's death also affected the life of an eight year old evacuee, John Cockett. In the summer of 1940. John along with his sister Lesley and other pupils from Fairlop School in London were evacuated to Risca. Initially John and Lesley were billeted together at the home of Mrs Mounter at 15. Danygraig Road. Although they considered Mrs Mounter 'a very nice lady', their stay there was ended when their mother asked for them to be re-billeted. Unfortunately when they left Mrs Mounter's they went to separate families. Lesley to a lady in Bridge Street, and was not treated very well, beans on toast being her main meal most days. Whereas John 'landed on his feet', being taken in by Mr and Mrs Jones of Jones the Café, Alan's parents, with good food and the most wonderful ice cream almost every

John's stay at the Café ended when the dreaded telegram arrived with the news of the death of their son, and the distraught couple were no longer able to keep him. Fortunately again John 'landed on his feet' when he was taken in by Mr and Mrs Charles at 34 Park Place. They soon became his Uncle Jack and Auntie Cis., and at the end of his stay in Risca, wanted to adopt him.

I remember that we had evacuees from Essex living in our front room of No. 1 Millbrook Cottages, Mrs McKelvey and her baby. Her two other children, a boy and a girl were billeted separately in houses on opposite sides of the road in nearby Mill Street.

# **OPEN DOORS**

Doors Open Days or simply, Open Doors, provide free access to buildings not usually open to the public or which normally charge. The first event, La Journee Portes Ouvertes, was held in France in 1984 and the following year the French Minister of Culture proposed that the project be internationalised under the Council of Europe. The Netherlands joined in 1987, Sweden and the Republic of Ireland in 1989 and Belgium in 1990.

With Glasgow being European City of Culture in 1990, Scotland ran a pilot scheme and in 1991 the events were united as European Heritage Days at the initiative of the Council of Europe supported by the EU. England and Wales ioined in 1994. Over 20 million people now visit European Open Davs and the idea has spread too many countries outside Europe.

Openings last year included 10 Downing Street & the U.S. Embassy in London and, in Bristol, the Redcliffe Caves & Bristol Old Vic whilst Tintern


Abbey & Tredegar House were attractions closer to home. The Risca Museum first took part in 2016 and last year St. Mary's church also participated. Both are taking part this year and are being joined by the Risca Male Choir who occupy the old Risca Urban District Council Offices.


#### Risca Museum

The Museum is on the ground floor of the old Risca Collieries Workman's Institute which was built in 1916 for the local miners. After the colliery closed in 1967 it was used as the local benefits office for many years and, after that relocated, the vacant building was used as the Islwyn Labour Party campaign office during the 1995 byelection. That same year it was purchased by Islwyn Borough Council using European Heritage money, putting the Museum on the ground floor

2016 resulting in a 7-fold rent increase for the Museum which is run by volunteers from the Oxford House Industrial History Society and receives no official financial support. It is a Grade 2 listed building.

Although the Museum is open from 10am to 12.30pm every Saturday, for Open Doors it will be open from 10am to 4pm on both Saturday 28th & Sunday 29th September. As well as the Edwardian Chemist shop and the 1834 printing press from the Starling Press, on display will be many items not usually available including artefacts, photographs & maps. Also, on Sunday 29th there will be a short walk & talk on the Risca Long Bridge (maximum duration 1 hour, flat ground) starting from the Museum at 1pm.





#### St Mary's Church

The current Risca parish church, St. Mary's was built in 1852 in a Gothic revival style. However, it replaced an earlier church on the same site and. during demolition of the earlier building, Roman remains were discovered in the foundations. Whilst a church in Risca is likely to have existed since the 12th century, it has been suggested that the site may be of Celtic origin. As well as the church itself being Grade 2 listed, the entrance gateway and the remains of the churchvard cross are separately Grade 2 listed.

The church will open from 10.30am to 4pm on Saturday 28th September. The historic parish records of Baptisms, Marriages & Burials will be available for inspection. Inside are many interesting monuments and dedications notably the magnificent stained glass window commemorating

the mining history of the parish which was only installed a few years ago following a long campaign. Outside are headstones and grave memorials with historical importance to Risca including the

gravestones of two brothers who died in the 1860 Black Vein Colliery explosion. There will be leaflets available indicating the location of some of the most interesting sights both inside and outside the church and booklets on the full history of the church will be on sale.

#### Risca Male Choir

The old Council Offices on St. Mary's Street will open from 10.30am to 4pm on Saturday 28th September. The building was completed in 1912 for the Risca Urban District Council and remained its headquarters until it ceased to exist after local

government reorganisation in 1974. Since 1988 it has been the home of RMC, the Risca Male Choir, which has gained a high reputation both in the UK and abroad. The outside of the building is virtually unchanged including the clock which has been renovated by the choir. Internally, many original features remain and the room which operated as the Council chamber can be inspected.

Choir members will be in attendance and the illustrated history of the choir 'The First Forty Years' and selected CD's will be available to purchase.





## Of Ducklings and Gulls

Those of our readers who have been with us for any length of time will know it's not only swans which need our help, but it is true that by far the majority of our rescues do involve 'water' birds in the broadest sense. This time, its ducklings (mallard) and gulls (Lesser Black Backed); the two stories are not related.

We received a family of eight tiny day old ducklings, their catastrophic separation from mother duck in a totally regrettable incident involving a speeding motorist on the outskirts of Cardiff. We have vears of experience in dealing with these tiny creatures; at some stage this always involves moving them on for 'finishing' prior to release, due to limited capacity this might be sooner rather than later. And so it was with this group. A characteristic which marks some mallard families is they are incredible 'athletes', capable of jumping considerable heights from a standing start: doubtless a very useful attribute in their survival kit! So we loaded the ducklings into what we considered a suitable box and set off for Vale Wildlife Rescue at Beckford, Horror of horrors, when we arrived and booked the birds in, we found we had only six ducklings. Despite emptying the back of the car we could find no trace of the two missing ducklings and neither could we hear them, we would have expected their characteristic high pitched contact calls to have been apparent. There was nothing, so we set off for home. Stuck in traffic at some point during the return journey we did hear that call, and eventually found two little ducklings in one of my wellington boots. Clearly. they had jumped from the bottom of the box, locating one of the



their predicament, whereupon we were

carrying slots and transferred themselves to the boot. So, for these two, the whole process had to be repeated, for which, it seems, they were none the worse.

A local food manufacturing /processing company has learnt how careful they have to be regarding the management of open topped road-going containers, by ensuring they are fully covered when they are not in use. One such recently emptied container (but not washed and cleaned because its use is for unwanted leftovers) was found by four adult gulls at some time during the night, and clearly was thought to contain some tasty food items. Whether it did or didn't, the actual residue was in fact a curry sauce colour; let's say turmeric yellow!

called to arrange transport, care and rehabilitation. In fact we were in a near identical situation three years ago, and so had no hesitation in, once again, involving Vale Wildlife Rescue. The gulls are recovering well. By an odd coincidence, on 6th July, The Times carried a picture of a Herring Gull which had met with a similar misfortune some 100 miles or so away, and was cleaned by the staff at another local wildlife hospital.



# Claerwen Dam and Reservoir in the Elan Valley



The severe drought of 1937 served to give warning of the increasing need for much greater water storage capacity. Proposals for a large new dam in the upper Claerwen Valley were at an advanced stage by early 1939, but the Second World War meant that the demands of wartime production itself put even greater strains on the existing water supplies. The increasingly urgent calls for a new dam and reservoir on the Claerwen were to be reactivated soon after the end of the war.

It is a measure of its size that the Claerwen dam was to create a reservoir which holds almost as much water as the combined total of the three earlier dams built in the neighbouring Elan Valley. The dam is 184ft (56m) high and 1167ft (355m) long.

The Claerwen dam was designed to be in keeping with the appearance of the much older structures nearby.

Although built in concrete, the

huge dam was faced with dressed stone.
The construction of the Claerwen dam, the last of the dams in the district, took six years, using a workforce of 470. The Claerwen dam was ceremonially declared open by the newly crowned Queen Elizabeth in October 1952, in one of the first official engagements of her reign.
