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THE MYSTERY OF THE MEMORIAL PLAQUE

DISCOVERED IN RHIWDERIN

(PART 2)

I will open this part of the article with a photograph of Eveswell Street as it was before W.W. 2. It is likely that many of the people standing pictured in the group may have died during the bombing incident, perhaps even Albert Garland was amongst this group.

The Memorial Plaque for A. Garland is engraved from Fellow Workers Npt. Corporation, Red & White Services, Barlows Furnishers, Richards

Caterers, & Friends Rodney Road. We can presume that all the people mentioned in the plaque must have worked with and known Albert

Garland. They possibly collected money and contributed to and paid for the Memorial Plaque. The first question is – Where was it intended to be attached by means of the four corner holes? Suggestions that have been made to me include that the plaque could possibly be screwed to a coffin containing the unidentified remains of the bomb victims, or secured to a wall in Albert's local school or church.

was it that the Plaque ended up in this cottage garage in Rhiwderin? Maybe a previous owner of the cottage was a relative or friend or fellow worker of Albert Garland and for some particular reason had retained possession of the Plaque.

An informative local history book The History of Newport Borough by Hadyn Davis mentions that Albert Garland was the Bandmaster for the


> commanding officer of the same unit for 41 years. Perhaps the plaque could have been intended to be mounted and displayed on the wall of the Sea Cadet's headquarters? Then for

some reason this did not happen and one of the people involved retained it and took it to Rhiwderin, where it remained.

There are also similar sized memorial plaques mounted in St. John's Parish Church, Maindee. This may have been Albert Garland's local place of worship.

I have attempted to contact the Sea Cadets to see if they held any information about their former Bandmaster Albert Garland, leaving messages on their answer phone and sending them emails. The only response was an acknowledgement of my emails saying that they would get back in touch later, but I have not had any further message.

As a matter of interest I have discovered that Sea Cadets Corps was developed locally from the Maindee Church Lad's Naval Brigade. I also searched in a recent telephone directory for local residents with a Garland surname, to see if any of them were related to the Maindee Garland family. I did speak to about six local residents named Garland including one with a Conway Road address (situated close to Eveswell Street), but none were related to the Eveswell Street Garlands.



I have also arranged with contacts in the Newport Reference Library to try and identify the names of people living at Deri Cottage, Caerphilly Close, Rhiwderin during the relevant period. I was hoping to discover a possible connection to the Maindee Garland family. Unfortunately, none of my attempts to discover any further information about the plaque or Mr. Garland have been successful. Basically there are two unanswered questions, where was this plaque intended to be mounted on display? And why did it end up in Rhiwderin? I have, therefore, decided to conclude my investigations and throw the search open to the readers of this Directory. I request that anyone, with any suggestions to contact the editors of the Directory with any relevant information or suggestions.

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

As the Restrictions Ease the Local Housing Market Booms

Is It Safe to Put Your House on the Market?

Changes to Welsh Land Transaction Tax

The Welsh Government announced that the Land Transaction Tax (LTT) would change, bringing the rate payable for properties valued at between £180,000 and £250,000 to zero. The changes will come into play on 27 July 2020 and will run up until 31 March 2021.

Properties in Wales selling for under £180,000 were already exempt of paying the tax, so essentially the Government has extended the threshold up to £250,000. The change will not include second homes or buy-to-let properties, which will continue to pay the existing LTT as well as 3% of additional tax.

As part of the coronavirus restrictions the government allowed and encouraged people to maintain their fitness with at least a daily walk. So more people than ever seemed to be getting up to Twmbarlwm for their daily fitness routine. That's great but I was amazed that so many people seem to think it's okay to casually leave their empty bottles and energy-bar wrappers scattered about the countryside. I often gather a bag of such rubbish on my walks around the mountainside.


The nature of this litter suggests to me it's dumped by people who are out exercising – runners, cyclists etc. – surely if you take that stuff up the mountain with you, it's not too much effort to bring the empties back down with you?

Those of you who are briefly passing through our landscape scattering your dross to the four winds should go back to class to revise the country code and learn to leave only footprints – and make sure your friends get the message too.

Another bone of contention during lockdown was the fact that the council had closed down most civic waste disposal facilities. Many people argue that this policy led to an increase in fly-tipping in many areas around the borough. I'm not going to speculate on the veracity of that argument because in my opinion there can be no excuse for the crime of fly-tipping.

To load a car or van with household detritus and drive miles out into the countryside with the intention of dumping it in a hedgerow or on a quiet mountainside is an act so premeditated and anti-

To teach such perpetrators the error of their ways we should all be more vigilant and report any incidents of fly-tipping. If you see it in progress or have proof of the culprits, you can report it to the police using their 101 service, you can do so anonymously if you don't want to get involved.

Don't forget, if you arrange to have rubbish collected professionally, it is your responsibility to ensure it is a properly licensed service – if a fly-tip is traced back to you, you are liable to be prosecuted and fined as much as the offender. I can assure

you that the authorities do try to trace the origin of the offenders and successful prosecutions are on the rise.

CTS did not arrange any "official" litter picks during the lockdown period but I am very grateful to a few members who went and did a clean-up on the mountain of their own volition.

At the end of July we had our first litter-pick since January. Nearly a dozen willing volunteers turned up and we collected twenty bags of rubbish and cleaned up a couple of burnt out mattresses. The following day, CCBC collected what we had gathered. We are always grateful when the council supports us so well in our efforts to keep our mountain and environs tidy for everyone to enjoy.

Maybe the most challenging lesson needs to go out to that group of young people who gather, like teenagers have always done, to have a bit of fun and have a sneaky drink or whatever. I know you don't think it's cool, but go on, take your fast food wrappers and unmentionable trash home with you – and behave like the little angels all your parents think you are.

I dare you, get "Keep Wales Tidy" trending – or better still, join us for a litter-pick.



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What Did You Do in the Lock-down Daddy?

To coin a phrase! The simple honest answer is that we carried on pretty well as normal. Apart from April, which was eerily quiet and uneventful, we were on the road only ten times, calls for our services continued more or less unabated. It is worth noting swan rescue activity is very largely a solitary occupation so that social

distancing is really not a problem.

The following statistics (below table) comparing the period March to July (up to 27th for 2020), are presented in support of this statement.

The most striking feature of our journeys until just over a week ago is how little traffic there was and in particular how incredibly easy it was to exit High Cross onto the main road. But now it is at least as bad as ever and manners of some drivers appear to us to be plummeting to new lows.

couple of rescues worthy of mention, but the two we will touch on both owe the eventual success to the sterling efforts of crews from the Fire and Rescue stations in Yate (South Gloucestershire) and Cwmbran. In the first case, our victim was a 'yearling' which had been driven away from his natal home by his parents, normal behaviour as the start of the next breeding season approaches and found himself

trapped in the deep narrow stream bed cut for the River Frome close to Yate town centre. Our picture shows the final act, made possible by the Fire Officer driving the swan towards me leading to capture and relocation to a sanctuary in the West Midlands.

The second required the help of a team of really fit guys to assist in the capture of the third (of seven) cygnets on the canal in Old Cwmbran, all of which had fallen victim to lost or carelessly discarded fishing tackle and all of which needed to be hospitalised. Our picture shows the final moments after the cygnet had been netted, just before taking charge of him for investigation, care and treatment.

Our involvement with 'tackled' swans continues unabated; sadly, nothing has changed in almost 40 years!

Sincere heartfelt thanks to Red/Green and White Watch respectively for making both these rescues possible in the most efficient and timely way possible.

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

The First Prize of War

As countries across the world implement lockdown strategies to stem the tide of the coronavirus, many people have taken the opportunity to reconnect with family and acquaintances. I am no exception and have been exchanging stories (and cute animal videos) with an old friend from Hamburg.

Curiously, there is one major tale from history that links our two cities, that of the SS Belgia.

The steamship was originally called the Irak and was constructed in Belfast in 1901. It operated out of Liverpool for over decade until it was acquired by the Hamburg America Line in 1913, when it was renamed the Belgia. In August the following year, the vessel was travelling from Boston, Massachusetts to Hamburg with a cargo that included flour, timber, and copper as well as animals bound for Hamburg Zoo. These consisted of various exotic birds, chameleons, bullfrogs, rattlesnakes, racoons, and even two live alligators. On 3 August, the Captain learnt that war had broken out between France and Germany and he was reportedly concerned that his ship might be captured by the French Navy as it passed through the English Channel. Claiming that its reserves of coal were running low, the Belaia headed towards the Bristol Channel but was refused entry to both Barry Dock and Cardiff Pier Head. As it approached Newport, the last of the Welsh seaports, it was instructed to set anchor and wait for a pilot to navigate the ship into the newly opened Alexandra Dock.

Some five hours later, however.

The men were armed with rifles borrowed from the Territorial Army, although these were reputedly devoid of ammunition. The Belgia was then berthed successfully with the Captain's cooperation, whereupon the policemen emerged from their hiding place and captured the liner along with its 20 crew, 75 reservists, and floating menagerie. The Germans, who offered no resistance, are thought to have become the first prisoners of the entire

The Hamburg America Line protested at the loss of the *Belgia*, arguing that it

breached the Hague Convention that protected ships against seizure if moored at an enemy port during the outbreak of war. However, a British Court ruled that the vessel was not docked at Newport when hostilities were declared and as such, the confiscation was lawful.

As a prize of war, the Belgia soon found itself swelling the ranks of the Merchant Navv under the new moniker. Huntstrick. At the time, it was customary to rechristen seized ships with names that bore the anti-German prefix, Hun-. In June 1917, the steamer was tasked with delivering troops and provisions to Salonika in Greece but it was sunk by U-39, captained by Walter Forstmann, one of Germany's foremost Uboat commanders. Fifteen lives were claimed in the attack off the coast of Morocco, including Huntstrick's Master, Robert Duncanson. Ironically, he lived in Clyffard Crescent, just a short walk from where his ship had been captured in Newport less than three years before.

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Fun and Safe Cricket for young Players at the Malpas Cricket Club

The FUNdamentals of Cricket

t is a decade now since cricket in Wales was reshaped to form Cricket Wales, a National Governing Body (NGB) seen by many as progressive, innovative and inclusive. The restructure allowed for central governance and increased investment from funding partners leading to increased support for recreational and representative cricket throughout Wales. The new Cricket Wales Board and Executive identified the need for strong and effective safeguarding procedures, with an expectation that minimum standards would be introduced across all cricket in Wales. (Recent abuse scandals in football have demonstrated the shrewdness of this approach). Following due process, I was appointed as Safeguarding Director and set about my work. As a cricket coach myself. I remember during my coach training that my role was to ensure we taught the FUNdamentals of cricket. We have to make sport FUN and enjoyable in order to attract children to the game and to retain

them within it. The starting point



for such an approach is a safe environment, having properly qualified people in place, ensuring those supervising children have Disclosure and Barring checks (formerly CRB), coaching qualifications and first aid certificates and so on. We have to remember that cricket is a little different to some other sports in that children and adults can play together. Children from the age of 13 can play alongside men and women, subject to appropriate assessment and in exceptional circumstances children of 11/12 years of age can also play. We simply have to get this right.

It would be impossible to manage all of the clubs alone – help was needed! There are six senior leagues in Wales, each league willing to support and encourage safe cricket and to use established protective procedures, but each league needed help to do so. League Welfare Officers were encouraged, linked directly to Cricket Wales, these individuals supporting clubs operationally whilst reporting to Cricket Wales – linking the cricketing network and providing support and encouragement across every club in Wales.

Alongside these remarkable volunteers, the Cricket Wales staffing team, also located in their cricketing communities across Wales provide additional support, pushing for safeguarding compliance. This combined approach, with the League Welfare Officers and the staffing team working hand in glove making huge inroads to make cricket in Wales as safe as it can be.

The creation and implementation of the Cricket Wales Welfare Council allowed all of these key people to come together, to share best practice, to receive specialist training and to help build an effective safeguarding umbrella for everyone.

Our ideology is that every club needs a safeguarding umbrella, each panel of the umbrella being a policy or a procedure, such as DBS checks, properly trained staff, reporting mechanisms and so on. It may sound simple, but if we get the panels of our umbrella in place, we keep those underneath it dry – an appropriate analogy perhaps when we think of a sometimes rainy cricket season!

Cricket has grown in Wales and we will continue to grow. We have initiated and embedded All Stars Cricket for thousands of children aged 5-8 and will begin Dynamos Cricket for kids aged 8-11 once the Covid restrictions ease. We support and continue to develop Disability Cricket (our Disability Team recently returning from a tour of Sri Lanka). We have transformed Women's and Girls' Cricket and continue to develop significant opportunities for everyone across the game. We have come a long, long way and quite rightly, we are proud to have achieved so much. At the heart of this are the Club and League Welfare Officers who continue to make such a huge difference, building the safeguarding umbrella to keep us all dry. To them, I say thank you, thank you for ensuring we don't forget the FUNdamentals of cricket.



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New Normal!(Motoring Post Covid-19)

What has Covid-19 done to the Motor Trade and the Motorist

We can all agree that it has been a very LONG five months since the nationwide lockdown started on 23/24th March I think most of us harboured the hope that it would all be over in a few weeks, indeed, we were encouraged to hold that thought by the Government. But with hindsight, it has become apparent that they didn't want to un-nerve us all by telling us on Day 1 that we've been in a devastating lock-down for four months.

A lot has happened in that four months... and just to be clear, I am not setting aside or overlooking the death of 1,566 of our Welsh brothers & sisters who have fallen to Covid-19. We acknowledge and bow our heads to this truly tragic statistic, but I do try to focus on motoring, the motor trade and the motorist in this blog and it is in that direction I turn my attention today.

Much of what we have seen (in motoring terms) has been generally unexpected, but again with hindsight, inevitable. The first big announcement was the suspension of MOT testing and the six-month extension. To be honest, that came as a surprize to us. We also thought that it may have been a mistake. MOT stations, like our own, stayed open, seeing ourselves as 'essential' in order to ensure the roadworthiness of the vehicle which continued to use the road. The arrangement has now ended and motorists are now flooding back to their MOT testers. September & October promise to be very busy months in most

MOT bays throughout the country.

Early on in the lockdown, we were saddened, which quickly turned to anger, about some scum bags who nicked a local doctor (Tom Rontree-Carey's) catalytic converter from his car WHILE HE WAS ON DUTY in the Gwent Royal Infirmary helping to save lives. With the help of local parts supplier, Fast Parts in Cwmbran, we were able to recover the vehicle and get Tom back on the road. That was a proud day for us.

We navigated the four months of lockdown without illness at AJs. That's not to say that we got off Scot-free. Early on, two of our team self-isolated at home for 14 days after reporting possible symptoms. These later proved not to be Covid related, so it would be fair to say that we got through relatively unscathed.

We've seen a steady return to normal levels of business over the last month (in keeping with many other businesses) and as road traffic has increased, so too has our workload and breakdown rescue activity. I think it would be fair to say that we will be back to pre-Covid activity levels by the end of September.

Then there's the secondary impact of Covid-19 over these last few months. Fuel prices in particular have been an unforeseen bonus for the motorist. We've seen petrol at £1.09/Litre and Diesel at £1.13/Litre in the Newport area. Not sure how long that will last. Vehicle sales were all but halted during the lockdown and we acknowledge that it has been a

tough time for the dealers.

However, they are virtually all now open again and we hear reports of brisk business on the forecourts. We wish them well in the coming months. The manufacturers on the other hand are facing massive problems and widespread redundancies are anticipated in the motor manufacturing sector when the furlough scheme comes to an end

So, where do we go from here? Well, we like everyone else in business, have adopted new working arrangements and hygiene regimes. We've never used some much disinfectant, anti-bacterial wipes and handgel. 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









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
